Subject: Project Updates - Rock Avenue & St. Ann's, Civic Center, Dilapidated Property Cleanup Program, Hydro Vac Purchase, Water Improvement Project, Lift Station Project and Vector Control and Airport Vegetation Control Update.

1. Rock Avenue and St. Ann's Road Project Update

Councilman Mike Sanchez recently requested an update on the ongoing construction plans for Rock Avenue. On April 29, 2025, I contacted the engineering firm Jacob & Martin to gather the latest information on the project.

Currently:

- The firm is still conducting core sampling of the subsurface to assess road conditions.
- A survey team was onsite on April 28, 2025, to collect data and perform additional studies in the project area.
- Once testing and survey results are analyzed, the engineers will develop and propose a road surfacing plan for our review.

At this stage, the type of surfacing material has not yet been determined. Councilman Sanchez has asked to remain involved throughout the planning process.

Once the road surfacing plan is finalized:

- We will begin contractor discussions, and
- Invitations for construction proposals will be publicly posted.

Councilman Sanchez also requested budget information for this project. The following is the proposed budget breakdown:



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A. Approved Budget

- 1. It is understood and agreed that the total amount of funds under this award shall be used for the Project outlined in this Agreement. Grant Recipient shall expend funds under this award in accordance with the approved budget specified herein. All Project-related expenses must be reasonable and necessary.
- 2. The Department may require a more detailed budget breakdown than the one contained herein, and Grant Recipient shall provide such supplementary budget information in a timely fashion in the form and content prescribed by the Department.

As part of the grant application process, we previously conducted community surveys. Additionally, as part of our community outreach, we are organizing a small giveaway of door prizes that were generously donated for the project.

2. Commissioner's Court:

Civic Center Fee Waiver Request - DWI Class

On Monday, April 28, 2025, I attended the Commissioners Court meeting. One of the agenda items included a request by Sonora Police Department Lieutenant Wendy Merket to waive the rental fees for the Civic Center, where an upcoming DWI class will be hosted. The Commissioners voted unanimously to approve the fee waiver.

Dilapidated Property at 277 Hwy South & St. Ann's

The second item discussed at the Commissioners Court meeting involved the dilapidated structure located at 277 Highway South and St. Ann's Street.

- The Commissioners were updated on the recent multi-agency meeting regarding the future of this property.
- They were informed about cost-sharing for debris removal, with each roll-off estimated at \$1,800–\$2,000.
- I cited the Sonic property demolition as a precedent, which required five roll-offs, to provide perspective on potential costs.

We also revisited the community group program proposal, which aims to use proceeds from the sale of trust properties to fund cleanup efforts. While other entities had agreed to this plan, the Commissioners Court previously voted against it.

I informed them that:

- I am willing to re-present this proposal.
- I have spoken with Sutton County Judge Jody Harris, who is considering placing the item on the next court agenda.

If approved, this program would eliminate the need for future cost-sharing by allocating property sale funds directly toward city cleanup efforts.

3. HydroVac Trailer Purchase

As part of the recently received Certificate of Obligation (CO) funds, we are proceeding with the planned purchase of a HydroVac trailer to support both the Water Department and the Street Department.

- A Notice to Invite Bids has been prepared and is attached to this report.
- The notice will be published in the Dry Devil's newspaper on May 8 and May 15, 2025.
- The bid submission deadline is set for May 23, 2025.

This equipment will help improve efficiency and safety in underground utility work and excavation tasks.

4. Water Improvements Project

Also funded through the Certificate of Obligations, the Water Improvements Project is now underway.

We are working closely with Triune Engineers, who have already started:

- Coordinating with Public Works Director Peter Duran
- Establishing staging areas for equipment and materials
- Work has begun on Well #4, located in the County Yard.
 - City staff are in the process of removing the existing perimeter fence to prepare for construction and upgrades at the site.

5. Lift Station Project: Federal Financial Statement Submission

With assistance from Public Management, we have submitted our financial statement report to the federal government to ensure compliance regarding expenditures related to federal and grant funds.

 A copy of the submitted financial report is attached to this City Manager's Report for your review.

6. Vector Control (Mosquito Spraying)

We are actively preparing for the mosquito control season.

- Our mosquito sprayer is currently undergoing repairs to fix a mechanical issue.
- Once resolved, a public notice will be issued later this week to inform residents about upcoming spraying operations.
- Peter Duran recently attempted his Vector Control certification test and plans to retest this week.
- I am also working to locate a certification class so that I can become a licensed operator as well.

7. Airport Vegetation Control

As previously reported, our large tractor mower remains out of service due to a damaged driveshaft. Our local Carquest has been unable to source a replacement part.

- Councilman Barker has generously offered to assist by reaching out to machinists or salvage yards for a potential repair or replacement.
- In the meantime, Peter Duran contacted Sutton County, and county employees kindly moved the airport property using their own equipment on April 29, 2025.

We have offered to reimburse them for fuel costs, but they declined reimbursement at this time. We are deeply grateful for the county's assistance.

• The county has also offered the use of additional mowing equipment for future mowing projects while our tractor remains under repair.



RESOLUTION 2025 - R-04

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING A CITY OF SONORA 2025 REVISED WATER CONSERVATION AND DROUGHT CONTINGENCY PLAN: PROVIDING A PENALTY OF NON-COMPLIANCE AND/OR DISCONECTION OF WATER SERVICES TO SUCH USERS BY SONORA WATER SYSTEM: A PUBLIC NEED OF AN EMERGENCY NATURE FOR THE ADOPTION HEREOF ON ONE READING: PROVIDING **PUBLICATION** FOR ORDAINING OTHER MATTERS RELATED TO THE FOREGOING.

BE IT ORDAINED BY CITY OF SONORA WATER SYSTEM, SONORA, TEXAS:

WHEREAS, the City Administrator has determined there is an urgent need in the best public interest of City of Sonora to adopt the 2025 5-year Update to the Water Conservation Plan and Drought Contingency Plan, and the City Administrator further determines that such a public need is of an emergency nature and the requirement of two required separate readings of the subject Resolution be dispensed with and waived; WHEREAS, the City Administrator now desires to evidence its approval of the 2025 5-Year Update to the Water Conservation/Emergency Demand Management Plan and adopt such a plan as an official policy of City of Sonora;

Now. Therefore

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SONORA:

SECTION 1: Approval of the Plan: The City Administrator hereby approves and adopts as City of Sonora Water Conservation/ Drought Contingency Plan, the 2025 5-Year Update to the Water Conservation/ Drought Contingency Plan attached hereto as Exhibit "A" to be included in full as a part of this Resolution as if recited verbatim herein. Sonora commits to implement the program according to the procedures set forth in the adopted plan.

SECTION II: In regards to implementation and enforcement of the 2025 5-Year Update to the Water Conservation/ Drought Contingency Plan, the City Administrator is designated as the official responsible for implementation and enforcement, and the following guidelines are adopted:

1. Mild Drought occurs when:

- (a) Average daily water consumption reaches 80% of safe design capacity of the water system. (1.68 MGD.)
- (b) Consumption (80%) has existed for a period of three days.
- (c) Weather conditions are to be considered in drought classification determination. Predicted long, hot, or dry periods are to be considered in impact analysis.

2. Moderate Drought conditions are reached when:

- (a) Average daily water consumption reaches 85% of safe design capacity of the water system. (1.78 MOD).
- (b) Weather conditions indicate mild drought will exist five days or more.
- (c) One water storage tank or one water well is taken out of service during mild drought.
- (d) Storage capacity (water level) is not being maintained during period of 100% rated production but storage recovers overnight during period of low demand.
- (e) Existence of any preceding conditions listed above for a duration of 36 hours.

3. Severe Drought Classification is reached when:

- (a) Average daily water consumption reaches 90% of safe design capacity of the water system Average daily water consumption will not enable storage levels to be maintained or recover overnight during periods of low demand. (1.890 MGD.)
- (b) System demand exceeds available high service pump capacity.
- (c) Any two conditions listed in Moderate Drought Classification occur for a 24 hour period.

4. Critical Drought Classification is reached when:

- (a) Average daily water consumption reaches 95% of safe design capacity of the water system in a 24 hour period. (1.99 MGD)
- (b) Average daily water consumption will not enable storage levels to be maintained or recover overnight during periods of low demand.
- (c) System demand exceeds available high service pump capacity.
- (d) Any two conditions listed in Severe Drought Classification occur for a 24 hour period.

5. Emergency Drought Classification is reached when:

- (a) Average daily water consumption reaches 100% of safe design capacity of the water system in a 24 hour period. (2.1 MGD)
- (b) Average daily water consumption will not enable storage levels to be maintained or recover overnight during periods of low demand.
- (c) System demand exceeds available high service pump capacity.
- (d) Any two conditions listed in Critical Drought Classification occur for a 24 hour period.
- (e) Water system is contaminated either accidentally or intentionally. Emergency condition is reached immediately upon detection.
- (f) Water system fails from acts of God (tornadoes, hurricanes) or man. Emergency condition is reached immediately upon detection.

In the event Critical classification conditions persist (Item 4) for an extended period of time, City of Sonora may ration water usage and/or terminate service to selected users of the system in accordance with the following sequence:

- (1) Recreational Users
- (2) Industrial Users
- (3) Commercial Users
- (4) Residential Users
- (5) School Users
- (6) Hospitals, Dialysis Centers, or Public Health and Safety Facilities

SECTION III: Users of City of Sonora water except for city use, which do not comply with Section II of this Resolution, shall be subject to a penalty of noncompliance and/or disconnection or discontinuance of water services to such users by Sonora Water System.

First violation - The customer will be notified by written notice of their specific violation.

Second violation - After written notice the utility may install a flow restricting device in the line to limit the amount of water which will pass through the meter in a 24 hour period. The utility may charge the customer for the actual cost of installing and removing the flow restricting device, not to exceed \$50.00.

Third violation - After second written notice the utility may charge the customer a penalty of noncompliance. Any person who violates this Plan is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) and not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Each day that one or more of the provisions in this Plan is violated shall constitute a separate offense. If a person is convicted of three or more distinct violations of this Plan, the city shall, upon due notice to the customer, be authorized to discontinue water service to the premises where such violations occur. Services discontinued under such circumstances shall be restored only upon payment of a re-connection charge, hereby established at \$50.00, and any other costs incurred by the city of Sonora in discontinuing service. In addition, suitable assurance must be given to the City Administrator that the same action shall not be repeated while the Plan is in effect. Compliance with this plan may also be sought through injunctive relief in the district court.


Subsequent violations - The utility may discontinue service at the meter for a period of seven (7) days, or until the end of the calendar month, whichever is LESS. The normal reconnect fee of the utility will apply for restoration of service.

SECTION IV: City of Sonora, City Administrator finds and declares that a sufficient written notice of the date, hour, place, and subject of the meeting of City of Sonora WaterSystem was posted for the time required by law preceding this meeting and that such place of posting was readily accessible at all times to the general public; and that all of the foregoing was done as required by law; and that this meeting has been open to the public as required by law at all times during which this Resolution and the subject matter thereof has been discussed, considered and formally acted upon.

City of Sonora further ratifies, approves and confirms such written notice and the contents and posting thereof.

Swimming Pool Rental Proposal

Event Date: Summer Season

Proposal for Pool Rental Fee Adjustment and Addition of Extended Hour Packages

Purpose:

To revise the current pool rental fee structure and introduce extended rental hour options to ensure sustainable operations, fair compensation for staff, and an improved experience for patrons.

Current Fee Structure:

- \$100 for 1–40 swimmers
- \$150 for 41+ swimmers
- Duration: 1.5 hours
- Staffing: Up to 3 lifeguards plus 1 manager
- Lifeguard pay: Approx. \$10/hour
- Current estimated profit: \$80 per rental

Rationale for Change:

- Underpriced Labor and Operational Costs: With rising costs in staffing, maintenance, and utilities, the current pricing model does not reflect the true cost of hosting a party, especially when multiple lifeguards and a manager are required.
- 2. **No Extended Hour Option**: Many patrons request longer parties, but no official extended-hour package exists. This leads to informal or inconsistent arrangements and missed revenue opportunities.
- 3. **No Tier for Larger Groups**: Groups above 41 swimmers are not adequately accounted for in the current structure, potentially compromising safety and staff coverage.

Proposal: Summer Swim Pass Package

Currently, our pool admission is \$2 per entry, which adds up to approximately \$100 for a patron who attends daily over a 50-day summer season. At this time, we do not offer a season pass option, though several patrons have expressed interest in a more convenient and cost-effective solution.

To better serve our regular visitors and encourage more frequent use, I propose implementing a **Summer Swim Pass Package** with the following structure:

Individual Pass:

• Cost: \$75

• Savings: Up to \$25 over the full season for daily swimmers

• Benefit: Offers unlimited swims for the summer season

Family Pass Options:


• Family of 2: \$125

Family of 3: \$175Family of 4: \$225

• Family of 5: \$275

These packages provide convenience to frequent swimmers while generating upfront revenue for the facility. Even if only a portion of patrons opt in, the program will likely increase attendance consistency and satisfaction.

This is a simple way to reward our loyal users, promote active lifestyles, and streamline entry operations during the busy summer months.

With the new I-27 this would relive the congestion on 1-35 by diverting traffic to Del Rio then to Sonora. As well as, open new opportunities for Del Rio to increase imports through their ports.
