**Subject:** Emergency Watershed Protection Program – Letter of Intent and Meeting Recap

On August 21, 2021, Mayor Juanita Gomez, Sutton County Judge Jody Harris, and I met with representatives of the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) regarding the Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) Program.

During this meeting, we learned of a funding opportunity designed to assist communities like Sonora with:

- Debris clogging waterways
- Unstable stream banks
- Severe erosion jeopardizing public infrastructure
- Wind-borne debris removal
- Damage to upland sites due to stripping of protective vegetation by fire or drought

This program operates on a cost-share basis (75% federal / 25% local), with the local share eligible through either cash or in-kind contributions. An NRCS engineer was present to address our technical guestions, and we discussed potential priority projects, including:

- 1. Wastewater Treatment Plant Crossing Armoring banks to protect critical infrastructure.
- 2. Concho Bridge (Concho Street / 300 block) Riprap or material to stabilize and protect the bridge base.
- 3. Hillside Street Crossing near Love's Funeral Home Reinforcement of stream banks, potential riprap installation.
- 4. Roadway Surfaces Possible assistance with resurfacing areas eroded by the recent event.

For context, in 2018, City Manager Edward Carrasco applied for and was approved under the same program for work at the wastewater treatment plant crossing. However, the City was unable to meet the 25% match requirement due to financial constraints at the time, and the grant was declined.

On August 22, 2021, Mayor Gomez and I submitted a Letter of Intent to NRCS indicating the City's interest in pursuing assistance under the program. This letter is non-binding, serving only as notice of our intent to explore participation. Under program requirements, we had 60 days from the date of the disaster event (July 4, 2025) to submit this letter.

Dear Kristy Oates:

We request Federal assistance under the provisions of section 216 of the Flood Control Act of 1950, Public Law 81-516 or section 403 of the Agricultural Credit Act of 1978, Public Law 95-334, to restore damages sustained in Sutton County by the major flooding event on July 4, 2025. This work is needed to safeguard lives and property from an imminent hazard of related to erosion affecting low-water crossings, bridges, and roadway structures within the city limits. Several areas are at risk where flowing water undermines banks, damages bridge bases, and accelerates roadway erosion. Protective measures are needed to armor stream banks, stabilize bridge foundations, and repair eroded areas to prevent further roadway damage, ensure public safety, and maintain reliable access throughout the community.

We are a local government with a legal interest in or responsibility for the values threatened by the watershed emergency. We understand, as sponsors of emergency watershed protection measures, that our responsibilities will include:

- Contributing a share of the project costs, as determined by NRCS, by providing funds or eligible services necessary to undertake the activity.
- Obtaining any necessary real property rights, water rights, and regulatory permits.
- Agreeing to provide for any required operation and maintenance of the completed emergency measures.

We have exhausted or have insufficient funding or other resources available to provide adequate relief from applicable hazards. We acknowledge that NRCS will not provide funding for activities undertaken by a sponsor prior to the signing of an agreement between NRCS and the sponsor.

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## EMERGENCY WATERSHED PROTECTION PROGRAM

#### Overview

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) administers the Emergency Watershed Protection Program (EWPP) which responds to emergencies created by natural disasters. It is not necessary for a national emergency to be declared for an area to be eligible for assistance.

The EWP Program is a recovery effort aimed at relieving imminent hazards to life and property caused by floods, fires, windstorms, and other natural disasters. All projects must have a project sponsor. NRCS may bear up to 75 percent of the eligible construction cost of emergency measures (90 percent within limited-resource areas as identified by the U.S. Census data). The remaining costs must come from local sources and can be in the form of cash or in-kind services.

#### Type of Work Authorized

EWP is designed for installation of recovery measures to safeguard life and property as a result of a natural disaster. Threats that the EWP Program addresses are termed watershed impairments. These include, but are not limited to:

- debris-clogged waterways,
- · unstable streambanks,
- severe erosion jeopardizing public infrastructure
- · wind-borne debris removal, and
- damaged upland sites stripped of protective vegetation by fire or drought.

The program can include purchasing floodplain easements. These easements restore, protect, maintain, and enhance the functions and values of the floodplain, including associated wetlands and riparian areas. They also conserve natural values including fish and wildlife habitat, water quality, flood water retention and ground water recharge, as well as safeguard lives and property from floods, and the results of erosion.

EWP work is not limited to any one set of prescribed measures. NRCS completes a Damage Survey Report which provides a site-by-site investigation of the work and measures necessary to protect life and property from additional flooding and soil erosion. NRCS will only provide funding for work that is necessary to reduce applicable threats. Should sponsors want to increase the level of protection, the sponsor will be responsible for paying 100 percent of the costs of the upgrade and additional work.



#### Eligibility

Public and private landowners are eligible for assistance but must be represented by a project sponsor.

Sponsors include legal subdivisions of the State, such as a city, county, general improvement district, conservation district, or any Native American tribe or tribal organization.

#### Sponsor's Obligations

Sponsors are responsible for:

- providing land rights to implement repair work,
- securing all necessary permits,
- furnishing the local cost share,
- accomplishing required works of improvement to remove the imminent threat to life and property,
- performing any necessary operation and maintenance.



Due to extreme rainfall on December 28, 2019, Tillatoba Creek in the Town of Charleston, Tallahatchie County, Mississippi, had extensive flood flows which caused bank sloughing that endangered the main access road to the local hospital and other associated infrastructure. After EWP repairs, the road shoulder was restored and the streambank stabilized to prevent further sloughing and danger to the traveling public on the hospital road.

#### Criteria for Assistance

All EWP works of improvement must reduce threat to life and property; be economically, environmentally, and socially defensible; and be technically sound.

#### How Do I Obtain Assistance?

If your land has suffered severe damage that may qualify for the EWP Program, you should contact your local NRCS office and request assistance. City, county, state governments, flood and water control districts, and soil and water conservation districts are the most common sponsors of EWP projects. More information is available from NRCS offices throughout the United States and the Caribbean and Pacific Islands areas.

#### **Emergency Watershed Protection Cost Share**

The NRCS contribution toward the implementation of emergency measures may not exceed 75 percent of the construction cost, including work done to offset or mitigate adverse impacts as a result of the emergency measures.

However, if NRCS determines that an area qualifies as a limited resource area, the Federal contribution toward the implementation of emergency measures may not exceed 90 percent of the construction cost of such emergency measures.

NRCS may provide technical assistance as services and/ or funds to plan, design, and contract the emergency measures, subject to an agreement between NRCS and the Sponsor.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is in receipt of your letter dated August 22, 2025, requesting assistance through the Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) Program to restore damage from the Texas Severe Storms and Flooding FEMA DR-4879 July 2025.

NRCS provides financial assistance to restore watershed impairments that pose a threat to life and property. Staff from NRCS will be contacting you within the next two weeks to schedule a time to conduct a preliminary assessment of the impacts from the storm. If protective measures fall within the scope of the EWP Program, a formal Damage Survey Report (DSR) will be completed by NRCS staff with your participation. The DSR will determine if the project is eligible for EWP assistance. The assessment and DSR should be completed within 60 days of your request for assistance. The completed DSR will be submitted to our National Office for review and approval. Funding for approved projects is based on supplemental congressional legislation. Funding must be received prior to entering into an agreement to complete the work. Any related expenses paid prior to any contract or agreement executed with NRCS are ineligible.

The EWP regulations (7 CFR §624) require recovery measures to be completed within 220 days from the time NRCS receives the funds. Only projects that are necessary for the removal of the imminent threat to life and property are eligible. Maintenance or long-term enduring projects that would extend beyond this time limit are not eligible for funding. Additionally, because of this time constraint, it is imperative that all land rights and permits be in place as soon as possible. Most EWP projects can be authorized by a nationwide general permit.

The EWP Program regulations found at 7 CFR §624.6 require project sponsors to obtain all necessary land rights and regulatory permits. The cost to acquire these is not eligible for EWP cost-share assistance nor eligible for in-kind support. To document sufficient legal land rights the form NRCS-ADS-78 Assurances Relating to Real Property Acquisition must be completed on all sites covered by the DSR including ingress/egress and any temporary work areas. An opinion of your legal counsel is required to accompany the form. This documentation must be completed and submitted to NRCS prior to the commencement of any contract.

To comply with the Clean Water Act §404, all EWP recovery measures must be permitted. Permits will be issued in the name of your entity as the EWP Program sponsor. Most EWP projects can be authorized by a nationwide general permit such as the following:

- NWP #3 Maintenance
- NWP #13 Bank Stabilization
- NWP #18 Minor Discharges
- NWP #37 Emergency Watershed Protection and Rehabilitation

It is your responsibility to determine which NWP to pursue and to submit to the United States Army Corps of Engineers any documentation or notifications that may be required for authorization. The completed DSR can be provided as part of the documentation. More information on these permits can be found at <a href="https://www.usace.army.mil/Missions/Civil-Works/Regulatory-Program-and-Permits/Obtain-a-Permit/">https://www.usace.army.mil/Missions/Civil-Works/Regulatory-Program-and-Permits/Obtain-a-Permit/</a>.

To comply with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA), a Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (PEIS) was developed for the EWP Program and is available upon request. The PEIS analyzed the cumulative effects of the recovery work as required by NEPA. The DSR documents that the proposed actions are sufficiently described in the PEIS, and no additional analysis should be required for the purposes of NEPA compliance because the site-specific activities will be tiered to the PEIS.

To conform with the Federal Financial Accountability and Transparency Act (2 CFR Part 25), your entity must have a Dun and Bradstreet (D&B) Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) and be registered with the System for Award Management (SAM) prior to the execution of any agreement with NRCS. The SAM registration must be current and maintained for the active contract period. Registering with SAM may be accomplished through <a href="https://www.SAM.gov">www.SAM.gov</a>.

- 3. Pursuant to §418.108(d) of the Government Code, this declaration of a local state of disaster continues the activation of the county emergency management plan;
- Pursuant to §262.024 of the Local Government Code, this declaration of local state of disaster, grants the exemption by Order of the City Council;
- 5. That this declaration shall take effect immediately from and after its issuance.

#### Honorable Governor Abbott:

On August 19th, 2025, the City of Sonora, Texas faced significant threats of life, health, and property due a short-lived Wet Microburst or "rain bomb" that caused a very intense downdraft of sinking air with a thunderstorm that produced strong outward winds and horizontal rain at the ground with damaging force.

The impact of this incident has presented itself to be an imminent danger to public health, safety, and welfare, and has caused extensive damage to essential infrastructure, including downed power lines, trees blown over block roadways, homes with severe roof and structural damage and vehicles with damage due to falling trees or debris. Based on initial assessments conducted by local officials, the extent of damage appears to exceed the City of Sonora's capabilities and resources. Therefore, I respectfully request the State's assistance in coordinating appropriate emergency support and recovery to aid our community.

Your assistance in this emergency matter, as it affects the safety and health needs of our citizens would be appreciated. Thank you for your continued support, leadership, and commitment to the citizens of Texas. Should you or your staff require additional information or documentation, please do not hesitate to contact my office.
